Bearing Fruit

The Gospel for the 5th Sunday of Easter Year B presents us with the beautiful metaphor of the vine and the branches. Jesus emphasizes the importance of remaining in Him to bear fruit. Like branches that cannot survive, let alone bear fruit when severed from the vine, our spiritual lives wither without a deep and sustaining connection to Christ. This imagery invites us to consider the nature of the fruit we're called to bear. It's not merely about individual accomplishments but about contributing to the flourishing of the whole community, to the glory of God.

Bearing fruit requires trust and drawing strength from the Lord. It involves pruning—letting go of what hinders our growth and embracing a process of spiritual refinement. This is not always comfortable, but it is necessary for growth . . . efforts, grounded in faith and sustained by grace, can lead to abundant life for ourselves and for others.

Building Community through Action

The early Christian community was revolutionary. It wasn't just about belief; it was about a new way of living together, where everyone's needs were met, and love was the guiding principle. The actions of the early Christians were as crucial as their words in spreading the message of Jesus. They lived their faith in such a way that it drew others to join them, fascinated by the love they showed to one another and the marginalized in society . . .

This calls us to reflect on our communities. Are we creating spaces where everyone feels welcome and valued? Are our actions reflective of the Gospel's call to love and serve one another? Building a community that mirrors the early Church requires both bold proclamation and bold living.

Love in Action: Reflect on the statement from 1 John about love not being merely in words but in actions and truth. Can you identify recent actions you've taken that express your love for others in a concrete way? What is one action you can take this week to show love more tangibly?

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
Pastor's Column

Laudato Si / Earth Day – Earth Day is an annual celebration that honors the achievements of the environmental movement and raises awareness of the need to protect the Earth's natural resources for future generations. First organized in the US on April 22, 1970, it sought to educate on the importance of environmental conservation. In 1990, Earth Day became a global event with more than 140 countries participating, addressing now the issues of global warming and renewable energy. In 2015, Pope Francis wrote an encyclical "*Laudato Si – On Care of Our Common Home*." The title *Laudato Si*, which means *Praise Be to You*, was chosen, because it recalls St Francis' *Canticle of the Creatures* that praises God for the wonders of Creation. In the encyclical, the Pope addresses critical issues related to the environment, consumerism, irresponsible development, and global warming. He calls for a swift and unified global action and presents a holistic vision for human flourishing and sustainable development. Some examples include: the 5Rs (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Repurpose and Refuse); transitioning to Renewable Energy, Advocacy and Policy, Education, and Ecological Conversion. This conversion calls us to see our interconnectedness with nature and take responsibility for its care. Furthermore, this should lead us to a change in lifestyle, consumption patterns and attitudes. For these reasons our parish celebrated Earth Day last Sunday. Following the 10am mass, hospitality was held in our Convent garden. Under a sunny sky, many parishioners came and enjoyed the food, drinks and good company. There was a festive corner for kids to do arts and crafts. It was a beautiful day to hold an e-Waste recycling drive, and a women's clothing swap. Of the clothes donated, many were very nice and even new. Many went away happy to have found something that fitted them, while benefiting our Mother Earth. I want to thank **Rachel Leluc**, who chaired the event, along with her team that promoted the event, sorted the clothes and decorated the garden —

Michael Walsh and St. Anne Friends of the Earth (SAFE), as well as **Isabel Tostoes** from the Preschool, who spearheaded Kids Korner and built an interactive garden and faire doors.
