


Seems like only yesterday (as the cliché goes), but the Season of Advent is here once again! It begins on the closest Sunday following the Feast of Saint Andrew, the apostle and martyr. This year, it begins this Sunday December 3, 2023. Growing up in the Philippines, the real meaning of Advent Season has been obscured by the early celebration of the Christmas Season (would you believe, beginning September) with houses, malls and shopping centers with the proliferation of Christmas decorations, lights, shopping and carols being played on the radio. While all these festivities have made my childhood ever so memorable, I could not help but reflect now that there is a spiritual dimension that seemed to have been forgotten, the real meaning of Advent and Christmas.

The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word, adventus or ad-venire, meaning coming or anticipation. It refers to the coming of the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ at Christmas but goes beyond that, for it encompasses not only the past, present but also the future, His Second Coming at the end of time. And thus, if we meditate deeper into this, we can say that we are always in the advent season, as the date of Christ's Second Coming is unknown to us (or even to Our Lord Himself). And as a mother, I would tell my children, "BE READY" for we do not know the time and the hour.

The Advent Season refocuses our minds and hearts to being always ready, to be prepared spiritually today and through the end of time. The Church's Liturgical calendar provides us an opportunity to set aside four weeks of spiritual readiness through penance (Sacrament of Reconciliation), reflection and meditation through prayer and through the examination of our lives (conscience), aland a renewed fervor towards change, a conversion process (by working on a better version of ourselves before God and neighbor). It is period centered on the Light of the World, Jesus Christ, symbolically represented by the three violet (purple) candles (of peace, joy and love), a rose candle (for joy) with a white candle at the center, Jesus Christ,

It's a beautiful start of our first week of Advent. that we also commemorate the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception in honor of Mary, the mother of our Savior, for without her fiat, the whole world would still be in darkness. The Immaculate Conception was declared a dogma of the Church on December 8, 1854, declared by Pope Pius IX (Ineffabilis Deus), in which he states the following: "We declare, pronounce and define that the doctrine which asserts that the Blessed Virgin Mary, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God, and in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, Saviour of the human race, was preserved free from every stain of original sin is a doctrine revealed by God and, for this reason, must be firmly and constantly believed by all the faithful"

## Reflections from Today's Gospel Reading Mark 13:33-37



Our Lord Jesus Christ, once again used a parable to tell a lesson for his disciples (and to the world) on the significance of spiritual readiness or preparation. In this parable, Jesus tells a story of a man travelling abroad (perhaps a wealthy business man, in today's world), and leaves his home or household to the care of his servants and orders the gatekeeper to be on the watch! Watch for what? Well, the master of the house may come home at any time - in the evening, midnight or the morning and may find the servants and the gatekeeper asleep. For us this parable serves a great lesson on being ready spiritually for the Second Coming if Christ. Are we ready to account for our life - all our good deeds (and bad). Are we ready face our judgement day before our Lord Jesus Christ. Some people may take this "being ready" parable in a negative way as it does instill some fear in us - what if I am not ready? For me however, I find this truly comforting, an act of love and solicitude from Our Lord - that He loves us so much, He could not bear losing any of us. It is a story of hope through what I would like to call, perseverance in our faith journey. Thus, through prayer and fasting we can all strive to a life of holiness, each day calling upon God to help us remain in His grace till the end of time.
