REFLECTIONS ON THE READINGS ON THE THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Who is the Prophet Jonah? The first reading in the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time introduces us to a peculiar and reluctant prophet of God, Jonah. He is the central character of the Book of Jonah in which he defies God's command to go to the city of Nineveh to prophesy against its people for their wickedness towards Him. Thus, Jonah tries to 'escape' from God by going westward instead to a city called Tarshish in which he sets sail. While in the sea, a major storm arises. The sailors blamed Jonah as the cause of the storm and that he was to be blamed for it. So, he allowed himself to be thrown overboard. But instead of imminent death for him, God had other plans. He saved Jonah by being swallowed by a large fish, a whale and remained there for three days and nights where he prays to God and finally commits to do what God wanted Him to do in the first place - prophesy to the Ninevites and command them to repent for their sins. "Forty days more and Nineveh

shall be destroyed." The people heeded to this and declared a fast as atonement for all their transgressions and all their evil ways. They were spared because of God's mercy and love.

The 12 Disciples of Christ "Fishers of Men"



The Gospel of Mark (1: 14-20), begins where the first and the second reading ends repentance from sin. Here, was seen and heard saying: "This is the time of fulfillment. The Kingdom of God is at hand." Then, Mark continues to what I thought was a disconnected event – our Lord walking by the Sea of Galilee calling upon some ordinary people, fishermen (Andrew and Simon) and asked them to be among his first followers. After much reflection, I realized that God's Kingdom can only be fulfilled, first through Jesus Christ's redeeming act of sacrifice on the cross and through his disciples and through all Christians in spreading the Gospel message, evangelization. And so, while only twelve were directly chosen by Our Lord, rest assured that all who serve Him, for His glory, and in whatever capacity that might be, is indeed among the few of His followers. May our Lord continue to bless all who serve.

Rules of Fasting and Abstinence

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms

concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards. (From the USCCB).
