God's Constant Call to Divine Feasts

In the readings for the 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A, we find striking parallels that delve deep into God's graciousness and the nature of divine invitation. Isaiah speaks of a grand feast prepared by the Lord, one that promises sustenance and joy, a removal of sorrow and a lifting of burdens. Matthew, on the other hand, offers the parable of the wedding banquet, where a king invites guests to celebrate his son's wedding. The interconnectedness between these passages reflects the continuity of God's love and outreach throughout the scriptures.

The rejection by the initially invited guests in Matthew's parable can be seen as a mirror to those in Isaiah's time and even our own, who often overlook or dismiss God's offerings due to distractions or worldly concerns. The feast in Isaiah represents the promise of salvation and eternal joy, yet many miss out on this divine opportunity. Similarly, in Matthew, the king's invitation, representing God's call, is ignored or treated with disdain, highlighting human tendencies to neglect spiritual wealth for fleeting worldly gains.

Drawing these passages together, it's evident that God's benevolent invitation remains constant, spanning across time and testament. The challenge posed to us, both as individuals and as a collective, is to recognize, accept, and prepare for these divine moments. Whether it's the grandeur of Isaiah's feast or the solemnity of the wedding banquet in Matthew, both underscore the importance of being spiritually ready and receptive to God's eternal call.

Meditating with the Rosary – As this is the month of the Rosary, I recently asked a group of faithful Catholics about their experience of praying the Rosary. Many were silent about their experience, and those who did answer shared that they found it repetitive and not very helpful. I felt the same way when I tried it in my youth. My college Christian friends even asked why Catholics would pray the rosary, repeating the same prayer over and over again, when Jesus Himself taught us *not to pray like the pagans, who babble thinking their many words will be heard* (Matthew 6:7). I found two scripture passages helpful to understand the richness and depth of praying the rosary. The first comes from St. Paul who teaches us that *sometimes we do not know how to pray as we ought, but the Spirit itself intercedes with inexpressible groanings* (Romans 8:26). I think we've all found ourselves in situations when we feel the need to pray. Perhaps it's a worry, a tragedy, a loss, and words are not enough to express to God the feelings we have in our hearts. So the heart wants to continue praying, even after we've expressed our prayer to God in words.

Praying the rosary, then, creates the structure for the heart to pray, and in the process, as St. Paul explained, we allow the Spirit to intercede with us and for us. The second scripture passage that I found helpful is Jesus' teaching about persevering in prayer (Luke 11:5-8). Why persevere? In the book of Daniel 10:13-21, the prophet tells of a spiritual battle with the evil one, and hence the need for perseverance on our part. As we pray the rosary, I like that we're not praying alone. We ask our Blessed Mother to pray with us and for us. I find that just as in meditation we use a mantra and repeat it over and over again to help us stay centered in prayer and centered in the Lord, likewise, the repetition of the Hail Mary prayer is like the mantra used in meditation. In so doing, we're not praying with the mind,



paying attention to each word of the prayer, but we're praying with the heart, to allow us to draw closer to God. An old definition of prayer is the *raising of our minds and hearts to God*. Spoken prayers, the mass, as well as reading scripture are prayers of the mind. Meditation is a prayer of the heart. And when we meditate using the rosary, repeating the Hail Mary's like a mantra, we are raising our hearts to God. In the process, we find peace as our hearts are drawn closer in union with God. So the next time you pray the rosary, try using the Hail Mary as a mantra, breathing it in, and breathing it out, to help you enter into quiet and into the presence of a loving God.


